As a culminating project, students will use their detective journals to create their own short stories featuring the cast from the novel. Some of these short stories will be acted out in class as we take our work from page to stage! *Who dares to play The Westing Game?*

ESL

In ESL the students learn basic structures and vocabulary of the English language through the skills of reading, writing, speaking, and listening. Currently, they are working on writing conventions, punctuation, and grammar. We are starting a descriptive writing piece in which the students will have to explain in detail about a topic.

5th Grade ELA

The fifth grade students have made a wonderful adjustment to Faust School. ELA students are working very hard in class and are learning about narrative elements and story structure. Students created posters after reading, "A Package for Mrs. Jewls." Posters showed all of the narrative elements found in this humorous fiction story.

Journalism


