What a great start to a great year! I am **amazed** at how much students remember from last year and how much Spanish they are using both in and out of the classroom! In Kindergarten, we are learning the basics of Spanish such as greetings, emotions, and numbers. In first grade, we are learning about birthdays and the calendar. In second grade, we are learning about families and physical descriptions. In third grade, we are learning about travel and geography. Last but not least, in fourth grade we are learning about sports. Throughout all of these topics, students will learn how to hold conversations, ask and answer questions, and read and write in Spanish. Thank you for all of your support! The Basic Skills students in 1st and 2nd grades have been very busy so far this year. In reading, they have been using a program called "Fundations". Fundations is an intensive phonics program that helps students achieve success in reading. The program focuses on tapping out the sounds of words in order to decode and encode.

In math, they have been learning "TouchMath". TouchMath is a program that emphasizes visual, auditory and tactile/kinesthetic learning and integrates all three into a few, easy-to-master techniques. The program works like training wheels on a bicycle. While facts are being introduced, students rely on the TouchPoints to give them greater support and balance. When facts are forgotten for a moment, the TouchPoints can be recalled as a reference point. After facts are mastered, the TouchMath training wheels may be set aside for good.

Just a reminder: Please remember to schedule time each day to read to your child/children along with studying their math facts; this will be time well spent! Mrs. Kelly- Title 1/BSI teacher

The district had provided the 3rd and 4th grade teachers a new math series to pilot titled *Envisions* for math. For the past month, this new platform helped "guide" my Basic Skills Instruction for students to

achieve personal goals and stay focused. As their BSI teacher, I was able to determine student growth and observe their progress in mathematics. This immediate feedback was critical to keep our learners on track.

The program/platform engaged students' interest level, transformed into high quality math practices that fueled growth, extended student learning, and built skills mastery to align to state-specific learning standards.



Apples, Apples, Everywhere!

Over the past month, students have explored the world of apples by conducting an Apple Study. We discussed facts we already knew about apples and created a list of questions we wanted answered. The classes explored the parts of apples by taking part in labeling activities as well as learning the names of various types of apples such as Granny Smith, Red and Golden Delicious.

Our preschool friends also conducted math lessons by counting groups of seeds, comparing groups of apples and measuring our classmates using apples. The students explored the life cycle of an apple by sequencing picture cards. Students read various nonfiction books about apples and we turned our Dramatic Play Area into an Apple Orchard where they picked and sold apples to classmates.

Last, students learned about the term "predict" as they guessed what would happen when one slice of apple was placed in water and the other in lemon juice. In the upcoming months, students will explore additional fall related activities as well as a new Creative Curriculum study about buildings!


